TURNBERRY PRE-TOUR • July 22-24, 2010

For those who would like to arrive early and play golf at Turnberry, rooms have been reserved at the Turnberry Resort. Depart on July 22 for an overnight flight to Glasgow, Scotland, and spend one night at Turnberry, overlooking the Ailsa Course, where Stewart Cink and Tom Watson dueled at the 2009 British Open. Tee times are reserved on the Ailsa Course before we board the *Prince Albert II* in Glasgow on July 24.



JULY 23/24: HOME • GLASGOW, SCOTLAND

Depart your home city on July 23 for an overnight flight to Glasgow, Scotland. Upon arrival, you are greeted at the airport for your transfer to the *Prince Albert II*.

JULY 25: PORTRUSH, NORTHERN IRELAND

GOLF: ROYAL PORTRUSH GOLF CLUB

Designed by H. S. Colt, Royal Portrush (Dunluce Course) is the only course outside of Scotland, England and Wales to host the British Open. Harry Colt considered it to be his masterpiece and not a single hole fails to impress. Calamity Corner, #14, is recognized as one of the world's most treacherous par threes, with its green perched on the edge of a precipice. Rarely has there been such a successful collaboration between man and nature.

TOUR: GIANT'S CAUSEWAY

Those on tour visit two marvels of the Antrim Coast. We first stop at the Giant's Causeway, a natural rock formation often referred to as the eighth wonder of the world. Further down the road lies Dunluce Castle, precariously situated on a cliff overlooking the sea. Lunch is a fine sampling of local cuisine at the Bushmills Inn.

JULY 26: BELFAST, NORTHERN IRELAND

GOLF: ROYAL COUNTY DOWN

Designed by Old Tom Morris, Royal County Down is admired as one of the most beautiful golf courses in the world and is consistently ranked among the world's top five. Laid out through giant sandhills along a narrow strip of land between Dundrum Bay and the Mourne Mountains, Royal County Down offers spellbinding scenery and a fine test of golf.

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TOUR: BELFAST

Famous for its political and seafaring history, this capital city of Northern Ireland is fast becoming one of Europe's favored destinations. Touring passengers will explore the Cathedral Quarter and the Golden Mile, stretching from City Hall to Queen's Quarter, home to Queen's University. Also steeped in literary tradition, Belfast is flanked by a series of scenic hills that were the inspiration for "Gulliver's Travels" by Jonathan Swift.

JULY 27: DAY AT SEA

What better way to enjoy our host vessel than a full day at sea aboard the *Prince Albert II*. Enjoy the ideal pace of travel as the ship glides around the coast of Northern Ireland to Scotland. There will be plenty of time for spa appointments and relaxing after two days of links golf.

JULY 28: INVERGORDON, SCOTLAND

GOLF: CASTLE STUART OR ROYAL DORNOCH

Golfers will choose between these two impressive courses. Reservations will be taken for your preferred course on a first-come, first-served basis.

ROYAL DORNOCH: The training ground of renowned architect Donald Ross, Royal Dornoch offers a tranquil location and one of the most challenging links golf experiences in Scotland. Bring your camera for the elevated fifth and seventh tees, plus the three fabulous finishing holes.

CASTLE STUART: The 2009 opening of Castle Stuart, designed by Mark Parsinen of Kingsbarns fame, marks the most significant British Isles debut in two decades. Among the spectacular vistas, the fourth tee might be the most memorable, with the 400-year-old Castle Stuart serving as a backdrop.

TOUR: VILLAGE OF DORNOCH & DUNROBIN CASTLE

Those on tour have the opportunity to visit the unspoiled Edwardian town of Dornoch. Our visit includes the small, charming Dornoch Cathedral, which dates back to 1224, and the famous Dunrobin Castle.

JULY 29: PETERHEAD, SCOTLAND

GOLF: CRUDEN BAY

This course is frequently referred to as the most dramatic golf links in Scotland. Cruden Bay's natural routing combined with its stunning setting and landscape invites golfers to return again and again. You don't have to be a long hitter to enjoy Cruden Bay. The key to a great round is in your approach to the imaginatively positioned greens.

TOUR: ABERDEEN & CRATHES CASTLE

From Cruden Bay, our tour heads to Royal Deeside. Here we visit Crathes Castle, one of the finest examples of a 16th-century tower house in all of Scotland. The castle's impressive interior is matched by the lovely walled gardens that surround it.

JULY 30: DUNDEE, SCOTLAND

This morning we say goodbye to the Captain and crew of the *Prince Albert II* before playing golf at your choice of either Carnoustie or Kingsbarns. Following golf, we transfer to St Andrews where we overnight at the Old Course Hotel aligning the famous 17th hole at St Andrews.

GOLF: CARNOUSTIE

The game of golf has been played at Carnoustie for more than four centuries. Tom Morris extended the course to 18 holes in 1867, but it was James Braid who brought sweeping changes to the course in preparation for its first Open Championship in 1931. Hogan's Alley, the Spectacles bunkers and the 18th hole, with its Barry Burn, all make the "Monster" one of the world's most memorable courses.
